

When: Every Wednesday





I am thankful to have been one of the few lucky people able to continue working in these tough times. I still get to see all the regular faces and keep in touch with you on a daily basis. They say gardening is therapeutic and it really has felt like it of late. The bees are out, the trees are bursting with buds, birds have beaks full of grubs and for a while I could almost be in a bubble of my own. Our volunteer numbers are understandably reduced in the current situation, but we are managing to keep in touch, and some are even providing support to the park by potting on plants, making displays and props and even building things! Our volunteers made this wonderful display board which has been sitting in the front of the kitchen garden. It is lovely to see everyone pulling together.

It is in times like this you realise how important our volunteers, school groups and internships are to the park as without my normal team around me it certainly has a different feel to it. This has become a community garden in every sense, and I can't wait to see all of them back where they belong. In the meantime, I will continue to keep on top of things as much as I can but, there may be a few more weeds than normal!

So, what have we been up to then:

Well the strawberries are looking brilliant and flowers are appearing at a tremendous rate now, which will make for a promising crop.

We have been picking rhubarb and lettuces regularly and leaving at the gate for people to enjoy. This weekend we were giving away tomato plants and there will be more to follow when the warmer weather starts again.








We have finished planting the summer cabbage, kale and Brussel sprouts.

The parsnips and carrots have germinated well and with the mix of rain and sun are doing extremely well.





The structures are in the process of being built for the runner beans, with our rustic hazel sticks from the park. We have even managed to get around the social distancing when you need a hand by 'bringing your wife to work day'!

And these pictures made me think we will look back at these one day and laugh, so I couldn't resist taking them, my volunteers having a tea breaks 2m apart!





You may have noticed that we have also been busy painting some planters in the kitchen garden, and contractors have been on site making paths to go around them.

This will provide another area to grow produce for people that are less able to get around the garden or find it difficult to get onto the beds.







We are also pleased to have been able to organise the old Houghton Hall Park sign into the formal garden. The contractors were very helpful in moving this into place as long as we dug the holes; Mark was happy to oblige! As soon as we have chance these will be getting a coat of paint and we will be designing a planted area underneath to provide a real focal point.









As you are aware, we had a lot of events planned this year, one of which was a great tomato day in conjunction with Silsoe Horticultural Centre. There were going to be over 50 different types

of tomatoes on sale for you to buy including heritage, blue, pink, white and giant ones; the choices were vast. However, once the event was cancelled that left us with 700 tomato plants too many! I have been busy helping to plant them with Simon, the unit supervisor and staff at Silsoe. A whole greenhouse has become the focus on these delightful little plants. In a few months' time it is hoped that we will be able to pick a bumper crop



and redistribute them around the care homes and sites of central Bedfordshire.

We will reschedule this event for next year, so this is your advanced notice!!







The formal garden is well and truly bursting into colour now and we are enjoying the daily splash of colour from the iris.

We also have a new planter built against the wall opposite the kitchen garden which will be planted up with annuals to attract pollinators.







This is only a snippet of what has happened in this last month, but as restrictions ease, I hope we will see more of you about and enjoying the wonderful green space of Houghton Hall Park.
