


Houghton Hall Park **July 2022 Newsletter**



Community Park Ranger Update



Nature Notes

Last month my nature notes was about the mullein caterpillar and how one of my verbascums had been savaged by them. Well despite all the apparent devastation, it has not only survived, but as you will see from the picture it has flowered profusely. It's an absolute blaze of yellow frequented by lots of bees.

The current spell of hot weather has prompted me to make the topic for my nature notes about providing drinking water for wildlife.

If like me you provide food and water for the wildlife in the garden all year round, you'll need to think about times when you are either busy or on holiday. Life cannot exist without water and if you want to maintain continuity

during these periods, then I have a very simple and quick to make DIY project for you this month. You can also adapt it to keep plants in pots watered. You will only need a few items most of which you may already have: -

- A glass wine bottle, plastic bottles work, but being very flexible, tend to collapse.
- A tray, I used a garden gravel tray, but anything leak proof will do.
- Two pieces of wood. Off cuts are good.
- Garden wire or tape.
- A brick or stone to weigh the wood support down.

Make your bottle support by joining two pieces of wood together as in the photo. Then wire your bottle to it. You can use sticky tape but it won't last more than a couple of weeks. The bottle needs to be positioned so the top of the bottle, when in position, is just above the base of your tray.







It's best to set up your watering station where it will be in shade and birds in particular will feel safe using it. Put some water in the tray and fill the bottle. Put your finger over the top of the bottle and turn it upside down so the opening is covered by the water in the tray. As the water in the tray is used up it will be replenished from the bottle. You can adjust the depth of water you want to maintain in the tray by moving the bottle up or down. You can place a couple of pieces of brick or similar absorbent material in the tray so insects can get a drink without drowning.

For taking care of plants while you're away, set up a similar arrangement with a larger tray and stand your pots in the water. Alternatively arrange pots around a bucket of water with a rag wick from the water to each pot.

When it's hot you can help cool you bet pet by brushing it with a wet brush. Water when it evaporates creates a cooling effect. Dip the brush in a bowl of water which is at room temperature; never use chilled water, you don't want to shock your pet. Brush your pet in the normal way, occasionally dipping the brush in the water. Cats don't normally like getting wet, but when it was hot, I had a cat who loved being brushed in this way.

Finally, my bees have been very busy in the sunshine, so next month hopefully I should have news of a bumper honey harvest. Until next time

Plant of the Month – Bupleurum



A popular flowering plant with origins in Central Asia and Southern Europe, *Bupleurum* is a hardy annual (or short-lived perennial) herb that is closely related to fennel, dill and other umbel-forming plants. The plant's most notable quality is its foliage, which is perfoliate, meaning its leaves (measuring about 2.5–5 cm) completely circle the stem so the common name thoroughwax is derived from "throwwax" (through-grow). With its bright-green foliage and small clusters of yellow blooms topping its multi-branched stems, *Bupleurum* is a favourite among floral artisans as a filler flower. It adds wonderful texture to and refreshing

colour to spring and summer arrangements so today, it is primarily used for ornamental purposes and is commonly featured in seasonal arrangements and bridal bouquets.

In ancient China and Europe, *Bupleurum* was prized in herbal medicines and used to treat a multitude of respiratory infections, digestive issues and other ailments

Kitchen Garden Recipe

To use from - The Garden: Strawberries



Strawberry Smoothie

Ingredients:

200g Strawberries
300ml Almond milk (any milk of choice but
Almond gives a nice flavour)
6tbsp natural yogurt
I banana
Handful of porridge oats
1 tbsp sunflower seeds (optional)

Method:

- 1. Tip all ingredients into a blender and blitz till smooth
- 2. Check consistency add more milk if too thick, half a banana if too thin.

Can be used as a breakfast smoothie or poured into lolly moulds and frozen as a healthy lolly.
