

Plant of the Month - Christmas Rose



The Christmas Rose (Helleborus Niger) is a small perennial of the Buttercup family, it blooms from late Autumn to early spring often in the snow. Niger – meaning black refers to the colour of the roots. It has evergreen compound leaves, of seven or more leaflets arranged like the fingers on a hand, that arise directly on leafstalks from the crown of the plant. The striking flowers, of five coloured sepals, are whitish to pinkish green, and appear during the winter, often at Christmas as it is completely unaffected by snow or frost. The plants should be handled with care as can be an irritant to the skin. The flower represents purity.



Nature Notes

The cold snap of the past week along with the snow has given wildlife an extra challenge.



The cold weather has brought more birds to the feeders.

To help them out I've put out extra feeders in my garden and have been topping them up twice a day. In addition, I've scattered a variety of foods on clear spaces of ground, protected by plants growing in pots. I've also tied some extra fat balls to the top of a trellis fence, making it easier for the bigger birds to access. For this I have been rewarded by an almost constant influx of birds. Blackbirds generally have been the first to arrive, feeding in the dark well before sunrise. The increased numbers of

greenfinches, goldfinches and tits have been amazing along with magpies and starlings.
Unusually the gulls have also ventured closer to the house, to grab peanuts from the bird table.
They fly in sizable a group around the garden

until one of them builds up the courage to swoop down and grab a nut in a cautious flypast.

I've noticed such is the difficult challenge to find food, the usual rivalries between the birds seem to have been put to one side. The other day I looked out to see eight male blackbirds together in an apple tree halfway down my garden. Nor would I have expected to see two male robins so close to one another, bearing in mind they will fight to the death, defending their territory if need be. Either it's a case of, because I've

provided a plentiful supply of food, they are happy to accept the situation, or perhaps it's just too cold to start a fight, which would use up so much precious energy.

The squirrels have obviously been hunkering down, as they have been noticeable by their absence this past week. As they don't hibernate, they will only forage when hunger forces them to during extreme weather conditions. Being a bit warmer today, two did come to the feeders but they only stayed long enough to grab a quick snack. Normally they will spend half an hour or more at the sunflower heart feeders.

On a warmer note, an update on the Willie Wagtail nest in my brother's garden in Australia. Two of the three eggs hatched, and the birds fledged. By the way did you know the ancestors of all songbirds originated in Australia. In the northern hemisphere it is rare for female birds to sing, but down under it's quite common.

Kitchen Garden Recipe

To use from - The Garden: Leek & Garlic





Cheesy Leeks

Ingredients:

6 large leeks

2 cloves of garlic

5 sprigs of fresh thyme

olive oil

1 knob of unsalted butter

100 ml single cream

100 g Cheddar cheese

50 g Parmesan cheese

100g Brie

Method:

1.Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/gas 4.

2.Trim, wash and slice the leeks, about 2cm thick, at an angle. Peel and slice the garlic, then pick the thyme leaves.

3.Put a large casserole-type pan on a medium heat and add a drizzle of oil, the butter, thyme leaves and garlic.

4.Cook until it begins to bubble and fry, then stir in the leeks. Continue cooking, stirring occasionally.

5.At this point, you have two choices: You can either stir the rest of the ingredients into the leeks, grating in the Cheddar and Parmesan, and tearing in the brie, then put it into the oven to cook for 45 minutes uncovered, or, you can do the following...

6. Turn the heat under the pan down a little and cook the leeks for about 35 minutes, or until soft, stirring every now and then.

7. Season, then spoon it all into a dish, or leave in the pan.

8.Stir in the cream and splash of water, grate over the Cheddar and Parmesan, then pull the brie into parts and put on the top

9. Pop in the oven for 15 minutes, or until golden and bubbling.
